## **Notes on Contributors**

**Birnbaum, Antonia** teaches philosophy at the University of Paris 8. She has published books that question the incidence of courage in thought, the becoming anonymous of political heroism, the refusal of mythological vengeance, and sacrifice as the mute exposure of the tragic hero. She also writes on contemporary art and has an upcoming book devoted to the concept of criticism in Rancière, to be published by Éditions Amsterdam in September 2018.

**Bojanić**, **Petar** is the director of the Institute for Philosophy and Social Theory (IFDT) at the University of Belgrade, where he has been a fellow since 2005. Bojanić directs the Center for Ethics, Law and Applied Philosophy (CELAP) in Belgrade, and the Center for Advanced Studies of Southeastern Europe (CAS – SEE) at the University of Rijeka. He has held numerous fellowships and visiting professorships, including at the Society for Humanities at Cornell University, the Centre for Modern Thought at the University of Aberdeen, the Institute of Advanced Studies at the University of Bologna and Torino, and the Institute for Advanced Studies in Bonn. A translation of his book *Violence et messianisme* (Paris–Milano: Librairie Philosophique J. Vrin; Mimesis International 2015), will be published this year by Routledge (Oxford).

**David-Ménard, Monique** is a French psychoanalyst and philosopher. She is Honorary Director of Research at the Université Paris-Diderot. For several years she has been Program Director and subsequently Vice-President of the Collège International de Philosophie, in charge of international relations (1992-1998). She was Director of the Center for Life Studies (Université Paris-Diderot, 2005-2011), where she initiated the research field "gender and sexuality". She currently holds the following positions: Vice-President of the Freudian Psychoanalytical Society (SPF, Paris); research advisor at the ICI-Berlin Institute (International Center for Inquiry); co-founder of the International Society Psychoanalysis / Philosophy; and a member of the International Network of Women Philosophers at UNESCO. Her recent publications include *Eloge des hasards dans la vie sexuelle* (Paris: Hermann 2011), *Corps et langage en psychanalyse* (Paris: Campagne Première 2014); *Avons-nous besoin des choses? Animisme et propriété* (forthcoming 2017).

**García Düttmann, Alexander** teaches philosophy and aesthetics at Universität der Künste in Berlin. Previously, he taught at Stanford University, NYU, Goldsmiths, the Royal College of Art, and Brown University. His most recent book publications include *Against Self-Preservation* (Berlin: August Verlag 2016) and *What is Contemporary Art?* (Konstanz: Konstanz University Press 2017).
